Select Health of South Carolina<sup>™</sup> has provided access to high-quality health care for South Carolinians for more than 20 years through its First Choice health plan. First Choice is the state's oldest health plan in South Carolina's Medicaid program, Healthy Connections.

First Choice serves more than 364,000<sup>1</sup> members in all 46 counties of the state and is the top-rated Medicaid health plan in South Carolina, according to the National Committee for Quality Assurance's (NCQA's) Medicaid Health Insurance Plan Ratings 2017 – 2018.<sup>2</sup> The health plan has held this distinguished position since 2010. First Choice is the first health plan in South Carolina to earn NCQA's Multicultural Health Care Distinction, which recognizes our commitment to delivering culturally competent health care. Select Health also offers First Choice VIP Care Plus in 39 counties of South Carolina. As a Healthy Connections Prime plan, First Choice VIP Care Plus<sup>®</sup> aims to improve care coordination for seniors who are eligible for and use both Medicare and Medicaid benefits.

Select Health is part of the AmeriHealth Caritas Family of Companies, one of the nation's leaders in health care solutions for those most in need. # Caring for Our Future — One Birth at a Time

The national opioid epidemic has hit communities all across the country, including our youngest members in South Carolina. Babies born to women using opioids during pregnancy may be dependent upon opioids at birth, a condition known as neonatal abstinence syndrome (NAS).

Babies with NAS may suffer from a host of symptoms, including shaking; gastric and respiratory distress; irritability; slow weight gain; difficulty sleeping; seizures; and excessive, loud, high-pitched crying. These symptoms can start anywhere from one day to one week after birth, and they can be compounded by other health issues related to the mother's opioid use.<sup>1</sup>

Select Health has taken a proactive stance to combat the opioid epidemic. Our programs are designed to help both mom and baby have a healthy future.

### **Prevention through education**

Select Health shares the national and state goals of helping to ensure the safe, effective use of opioid medications. We've taken decisive action to encourage the reduction of prescription opioids, the broadening of pain management strategies, and increased access to evidence-based treatment for addiction. This strategic, three-pronged approach focusing on education, prevention, and effective treatment is aimed at plan members, network providers, and the extended communities we serve across South Carolina.

In particular, education for moms-to-be about NAS is now a key element of Bright Start<sup>®</sup> — a program that teaches our pregnant members about the importance of prenatal and postpartum care, and offers guidance on various aspects of parenting and family planning.

In 2016, First Choice was responsible for managing 20 percent of all births in South Carolina and 41 percent of Medicaid births.<sup>2,3</sup> Helping these women have healthy pregnancies and working to give their developing babies the best chance to enjoy a healthy and happy future is a top priority for our plan.

As a direct result of education initiatives like Bright Start and interventions including member telephonic outreach and face-toface counseling, Select Health has seen:

- An increase in gestational age at birth among newborns delivered by plan members.
- A decrease in neonatal intensive care unit utilization.


## Prenatal care and family planning

Select Health also partners with network providers to improve the health and well-being of our members of childbearing age through programing and education focused on:

- **17P:** Progesterone for pregnant women, who've previously had a preterm birth, to help prevent subsequent births before 37 completed weeks of pregnancy, in turn reducing risks of serious health problems in babies born prematurely.
- Birth spacing and long-acting reversible contraceptives: Reduces the risks of low birth weight and premature birth associated with babies who are born less than 18 months apart.<sup>4</sup>
- **CenteringPregnancy:** Group prenatal care fostering an environment conducive to education, empowerment, and the sharing of experiences, strengths, and hopes for a common purpose to have healthy pregnancies and healthy full-term babies.

### Working together for a healthier tomorrow

A postpartum visit between 21 and 56 days following delivery is important for assessing a new mom's physical and mental well-being after the birth, and provides an opportunity for her to receive family planning guidance, breast-feeding support, and nutrition counseling for herself and her baby.

That's why Select Health collaborated on a pilot program with the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC) with the objective of increasing postpartum visit compliance of First Choice members delivering at the facility. At the conclusion of the pilot program, postpartum compliance increased from 44.71 percent to 46.56 percent. In addition, we identified future opportunities to:

- Continue to educate providers, clinical, and non-clinical staff at MUSC about the importance of the postpartum visit between days 21 – 56 post delivery.
- Educate providers on billing best practices, including how to code for our members' postpartum visits.
- Analyze data on members who did not have a postpartum visit between days 21 – 56 post delivery and identify potential barriers or interventions.

### Continuing care for mom and baby

Select Health has developed a brochure that serves as a postpartum checklist that is available to all our members who have given birth. The checklist identifies key issues, including physical, emotional, and sexual health; nutrition; and breast feeding. The checklist also suggests the types of questions or concerns women should discuss with their health care providers during their postpartum visit.

The checklist also contains important contact information for the Bright Start and Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) programs for members who need additional support. •

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# Making Fitness Fun

In 2013, Marcus Lattimore, former University of South Carolina star running back and San Francisco 49er, partnered with Select Health to create the First Choice Fit campaign. First Choice Fit uses football camps, targeted mailings, newsletter articles, website content, and recorded voice messages to promote healthy living and preventive care to First Choice members age 21 and younger.

It is important to help young members understand the importance of fitness early. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, one in six children in the United States is obese.<sup>1</sup> Combining fun and fitness to educate youth about the importance of eating healthy, staying active, and getting annual preventive well visits is one way Marcus and First Choice Fit are working to address the serious health issue of childhood obesity.

For Marcus, the First Choice Fit program is personal. He grew up in Duncan, South Carolina, and was a Medicaid beneficiary, so he understands the challenges our members face. He credits his life experiences for shaping his strong commitment to a healthy lifestyle and developing skills to overcome challenges. As First Choice Fit's spokesperson, Marcus has been a dedicated and influential role model for the children of South Carolina, and instrumental in First Choice Fit's success. At every event and in every message he delivers, Marcus' passion for serving young people across South Carolina and his commitment to giving back to the community shine through.

During 2017, First Choice Fit football camps for boys and girls ages 5 through 17 were held in Charleston, Columbia, Myrtle Beach, and Spartanburg. Attendees were encouraged to eat right, be active, and see their primary care providers for well visits.

Football provides a dynamic opportunity for athletes to not only teach youth about healthy living, but also share important lessons regarding personal development. In addition, the camps featured community health fairs with health screenings at no cost.

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

Diagnosed with leukemia when he was age 5, Santos has been on quite a journey during the past five years. Thankfully, his treatments have been successful and his leukemia is in remission. His desire to play football took him on a spring Saturday to the Spartanburg Day School and the First Choice Fit Marcus Lattimore Football Camp.

Jennifer Brown, a Select Health Care Manager, helped make this dream come true for Santos. Jennifer has served Santos and his family for two years. She called Santos' mother and arranged for him to attend through a special scholarship available for plan members. Santos' doctors cleared him to participate in the camp. Santos' 7-year-old brother, Antonio, also was a happy camper that day.


Santos and Antonio worked closely with Marcus and the other coaches at various skill stations and activities, including a vigorous tug of war — a camper favorite — that closes out the day. 

# Improving Health Through Education

At Select Health, we understand that education is an important social determinant of health. Research shows that individuals with higher levels of education have lower rates of many chronic diseases, are less likely to smoke or be obese, and are more likely to engage in certain preventive health services, compared to those with less education and lower income levels.<sup>1</sup> To increase access to learning opportunities for our members, we are proud to offer comprehensive educational resources to help them reach their learning goals.

### The gift of knowledge

Our member education programs include:

- Member Scholarship program: Founded in 2010, this program offers collegiate scholarships each year to First Choice members who plan on furthering their education or pursuing a second career.
- **Mission GED:** This program helps members reach their goal of achieving their General Equivalency Development (GED). Participants receive vouchers to

cover GED testing fees and are paired with a program coach to help support and encourage them through their preparation and testing.

• Reading Assistance program: To increase adult literacy and improve reading and writing skills among our members, the Reading Assistance program helps connect members to community-based literacy and limited English proficiency programs in their area.

With programs available at all stages of our members' learning journeys, Select Health is proud to support educational development in the communities we serve and further support our members' investments in a healthier future.

### **Education leads to success**

Precious, a First Choice member, became pregnant with her first child during her junior year of high school. Although she wanted to continue her education, she dropped out of school to take care of her baby full time. She thought a lot about going back to school and applying to college, but found it difficult to find the time and money required to first earn her GED. But then Precious learned about Mission GED.

"I wanted to get more out of life," Precious said. "I didn't want a job; I wanted a career." And Mission GED was there to help.

Thanks to the Mission GED program, Precious put her best foot forward and earned her GED in the summer of 2017. She is now looking to pursue a degree in physical therapy or join a dental assistant program.

It is success stories like these that make First Choice associates so passionate about the work we do.

"I get a tear in my eye every time we receive an application," said Elice Graham, Quality Performance Team Lead, who helps enroll members into the Mission GED program. "I know we're about to change someone's life. It's a joy to work for a company that sees beyond health care and cares for the whole person."

# Center of the Community

From Abbeville to York, the cities and counties of South Carolina are rich with history, tradition, and culture. Select Health has been a part of these communities and worked to improve them for more than 20 years. Our associates live and work in the areas we serve, so when we help our neighbors, we're creating a better community for us all.

### **First Choice Community Center**

Our commitment to South Carolina is why we opened the First Choice Community Center in 2009. The center provided local residents, both members and non-members alike, with access to health education, notary services, and SC Thrive's Benefit Bank, which helps people with food assistance, student aid, tax filing, and more. We were the first Medicaid managed care organization (MCO) in the state to open a retail location, and in 2017, we took that commitment to the community one step further.

On December 8, 2017, Select Health opened the doors to its new, expanded First Choice Community Center off Harbison Road in Columbia. The larger facility offers enhanced amenities, including a children's play area, demonstration kitchen, computer stations, and increased gathering space for meetings and community events, like the annual Jump-Start Back-to-School. Jump-Start Back-to-School events provide health screenings, information, and school supplies to school-aged children. In 2017, during its eighth year, Jump-Start Back-to-School expanded beyond Columbia to several regional events across the state.

The center gives local residents access to a computer center to apply for jobs, write resumes, and other services. The facility also includes a spacious kitchen, suitable for cooking demonstrations, and a designated children's area.

"The First Choice Community Center is designed to serve as a community hub," said Rebecca Engelman, Market President of Select Health. "It is a place to access services and support and is aimed at improving health, wellness, and overall quality of life."

### **Community partnerships**

South Carolina's communities are diverse, with a wide range of health needs. People and programs across the state are doing their part to teach South Carolinians about wellness, and we are proud to work with these groups to educate our members and increase access to vital services.

Select Health works closely with many organizations in the state and nationally to support our members and the community at large, including:

- Be a Mentor: This is a North Charlestonbased nonprofit organization that connects at-risk children with adult mentors to help them develop life skills to give them the best chance of success in the future. Select Health associates can volunteer their time to Be a Mentor, helping children in the community and developing strong and rewarding bonds that can last for years.
- Health Empowerment Tour: Presented by Select Health and AmeriHealth Caritas Partnership, IMARA Woman's Health Empowerment Tour brings health screenings, educational workshops, and professional assistance to women all across South Carolina. Now in its 16th year, more than 8,500 people have attended Health Empowerment Tour events since the program began.

- Lowcountry Food Bank Cooking Matters: Select Health works with Lowcountry Food Bank Cooking Matters to offer free cooking classes in communities all over South Carolina. Attendees learn about good nutrition, cooking methods, meal planning, budgeting, and how to cook healthy and delicious food in a hands-on environment.
- South Carolina Diaper Bank and Community Baby Showers: The South Carolina Diaper Bank strengthens families by providing a reliable and adequate supply of free diapers and baby items to families in need living throughout South Carolina. Along with our First Choice Community Baby Showers, we are helping children and parents to stay happy and healthy. The program provided more than 1,100 diapers to 500 community members.
- United Way: Select Health and AmeriHealth Caritas' 2017 United Way campaign — Together, We Care — was our most successful fundraising initiative yet. Associates from South Carolina and across the enterprise raised \$740,105 last year, and more than \$2 million to date, to support United Way. •



# Lower Costs, Higher Quality of Care

At Select Health, we are continuously learning how to better serve our members. By using the most effective options available and reducing unnecessary treatment, we are able to offer a better quality of care while controlling costs for the state.

In 2017, we reached new levels of service and cost savings. We saved the South Carolina Medicaid program \$226.6 million — a 58 percent increase over 2016. Since 2010, Select Health has helped achieve more than \$850 million in cost avoidance.<sup>1</sup>

1. Wakely Consulting was contracted by Select Health to conduct this cost avoidance study for state fiscal years 2010 through 2017. Cost avoidance figures are developed based on a comparison of adjusted historical per capita health care claims and administrative costs for Medicaid fee-for-service program members against the actual capitation or per capita fees paid to Select Health. The difference between the per capita claims costs and the capitation amount paid to Select Health is the estimated cost avoidance achieved by Select Health's participation in the managed Medicaid program.

# The Power of Education in Delivering Care

We are steadfast in our encouragement and education of all members as they take steps to improve their health. Some members, especially those with chronic conditions and multiple health concerns, may need additional support to find their way to wellness. That's why our Care Managers work to identify barriers and empower members to take control of their health. Sometimes, those barriers go beyond health care.

Sarah, a First Choice Member in her 50s with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, diabetes, and high blood pressure, was having trouble adhering to her treatment. "I was having the same conversation with her again and again about her blood pressure and blood sugar numbers, when usually I could educate a member after a few calls," explained Jera Elmore, a Care Manager with Select Health. "She would stop taking her blood pressure medicine when she was lightheaded, thinking it was too low. In actuality, her blood sugar was too low and she needed to eat," Jera said.

During one call when discussing her blood sugar numbers, Sarah made a brave admission — she had never learned how to count. "Her parents had stopped sending her to school in second grade after a serious surgery," Jera said. "It was a big deal that she felt comfortable to share that with me." Without a second thought, Jera set out to teach Sarah the order of numbers. She created a chart numbered from one to 100, mailed it to Sarah, and asked her to call when she got it. "For several months, we just worked on learning to count," Jera said.

With her Care Manager's determined guidance, Sarah began to understand. "It took about a year," Jera said. "I would let her figure it out. Once she got it, she was able to tell me the number and why it was good. She understood what the numbers meant."

"Jera walked me through what my numbers should be, step by step," said Sarah. "I got to




where I remembered everything she told me, and knew what my heart rate, blood pressure, and blood sugar numbers should be."


Today, Sarah understands her health, feels better, and has lost weight. Her primary care provider reports that she brings her number charts to every appointment. "I try to manage it myself now," Sarah said.

According to Sarah, Jera's educating and encouragement helped her conquer something much bigger than numbers. "She changed so much in my life," Sarah said. "She's brought me through a lot. I was in a really low place. I got to where I didn't care if I was here or not. Jera listened. When I started talking to her, it took a burden off me. I could talk to her when I couldn't talk to anyone. She got to feeling like a sister to me."

For Jera, being able to teach Sarah was an important tool for reaching their goal. "I met her there," she said. "The end goal is to be healthy and understand how to get there." Thanks to her new education, Sarah has a better understanding of her health and is taking a role in getting where she wants to be. •

Mary Black Health System, Spartanburg, South Carolina




Select Health 2017 results Select Health 2016 results

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# South Carolina United in Teal & White: Together We Care

Cancer affects people in all walks of life, and in South Carolina the risks for cancer can be even higher than other states. Statistics for 2013 reported by the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control rank the state 15th in the nation for incidences of cervical cancer and 12th for cervical cancer mortality.<sup>1</sup> African Americans, who make up more than a quarter of South Carolina's population, are at even higher risk, with African American women more likely to die from cervical cancer disease than any other group.<sup>2, 3</sup>

Faleshia Jones, Select Health's Director of Quality Improvement from 2012 to 2017, understands how serious an issue cervical cancer is for women in South Carolina. She also knows firsthand the importance of cervical cancer screening and early detection - it saved Faleshia's life. Her experience inspired her to co-found South Carolina United in Teal & White, a statewide coalition of Medicaid MCOs and commercial insurers, citizens, government agencies, and health care and advocacy organizations collaborating to support cervical cancer education and prevention. "This initiative will be a success if just one person is saved," said Faleshia.


One goal of South Carolina United in Teal & White is to educate people about the human

papillomavirus vaccine that helps prevent cervical cancer and the screenings that aid in early detection of the disease — when treatment is most effective.

The coalition also serves as a platform for encouraging everyone across the state to support cervical cancer education and prevention. Nearly 200 volunteers from South Carolina United in Teal & White gathered on the steps of the State House in Columbia on January 18, 2017, during national Cervical Cancer Awareness Month. South Carolina's five Medicaid MCOs joined forces for the event, in addition to the South Carolina Department of Health and Human Services, American Cancer Society, and other partners.

Several Select Health associates played prominent roles during the January event, including Faleshia, Kimberley Wilson, Senior Community Health Navigator, and Rebecca Engelman, Market President. "I'm excited about our partnership's energy and momentum," Faleshia said.

These varied groups came together to not only spread the message, but also to demonstrate support for survivors of the disease. During the event, it became clear that the message of South Carolina Teal & White was being heard and carried by people



from all walks of life. "I was surprised at the number of husbands who participated and wanted to give their support," said Kimberley, who serves on the Executive Board of Cervical Cancer-Free South Carolina. With that kind of support pouring in across the state, the coalition's mission of increasing awareness about HPV and cervical cancer is already happening. Together, we can build a healthier tomorrow.

Preventive health education initiatives are making a difference in reducing cervical cancer. Yearly HEDIS results from NCQA show an increase in prevention measures among First Choice members. We commend the Medicaid managed care organizations for working together to raise awareness on the importance of cervical cancer screenings. Collaboration is the best way to maximize impact and improve health outcomes.

# Bringing Health and Education Full Circle

Knowledge is key to health care. Just as we educate our members about healthy living, their conditions, and care options, we encourage our associates to learn and better themselves.

Samuel Bellamy, a Community Health Navigator with Select Health, exemplifies this spirit. In his role, Sam visits First Choice members in the field, going to their homes to help them learn about their health and connect them to resources.

Last year, while Sam was spending his days teaching members, he was spending his nights improving his own education through Southern New Hampshire University's (SNHU's) College for America program. AmeriHealth Caritas and Select Health work with SNHU to offer our associates tuition assistance for specialized programs in several different fields. This allows working adults to pursue degrees online at their own pace. AmeriHealth Caritas has also worked with other universities, including Peirce College, to further increase access for associates to reach their educational goals.

Through hard work and commitment, Sam became the first Select Health associate and the first associate from the AmeriHealth Caritas family of companies — to graduate from the College for America program, receiving both his Associate and Bachelor of Arts degrees in Health Care Management. "I've gone to school several times previously, but life always got in the way," Sam explained. "With College for America, it was a prime opportunity to finish something I started." After completing his bachelor's degree, Sam enrolled in Liberty University to pursue a Master of Public Administration degree.

Although he's still pursuing his graduate degree, Sam finds time to give back to his community. Inspired by his own children, in October 2017 Sam wrote and published *Hidden Gems*, an activity book that helps kids and parents learn important life lessons. He hopes the book can impart his love of reading and learning to the next generation. "Reading and literacy are critical for our neighborhoods and communities," he said. "That became apparent to me when I started learning about health literacy. There are a lot of adults who have deficiencies in their comprehension, and that can trickle down to their children."

As he has learned more through his studies, Sam has also learned what he wants to do in the future: help improve the lives of his fellow South Carolinians through public policy. "There are a lot of policies related to health care that affect our communities and may be damaging to our members," Sam explained. "Sometimes the people making these rules aren't in our communities and they don't see the effects of those policies. I'd like to teach them about what's going on and help change that."

For Sam and for Select Health, everything comes back to the community. When our associates improve their education, they learn new skills to better serve our members, and they can pass on what they've learned. By creating more learning opportunities for associates, we're able to teach South Carolina the values of health and education. "That's what's most important to me," Sam said. "Select Health's commitment to the community sets us apart from all the other health plans."
